



SIXTY-THREE years! Yet the mission has remained constant: "to encourage all to be followers of Jesus Christ and to provide a special place where people can meet with God and God can meet with people." Christian camping continues to be one of the most powerful and effective means of reaching into the hearts of young people and seeing God transform young lives (and older lives, too).

Again this year, close to 6,000 different people were blessed through the ministry of Tel Hai Camp. Again, try to grasp that number—6000! Think about all the tens of thousands of meals provided; the countless bumps on horseback; the many pieces of ceramic sanded and painted; the numerous verse memorized; the hundreds of songs sung and commitments to Christ made. God alone knows the depth of impact and change brought into the lives of so many young people, but I have seen it written on the faces, heard it from their mouths, and been as-



sured that God has etched on their hearts the Good News of Jesus Christ! God has continued to bless our desire to keep our mission as stated above the core focus of this ministry.



THE LAKE GETS A MAKEOVER

Many of you have driven past our lake over the past year and have seen the changes as they took place. The project began with a magnificent gift to the camp from the Tel Hai Retirement Center. As part of their own expansion projects, they blessed us by paying for the monumental job of relining the lake and island with native rock from the site. The need for this work was critical in order to inhibit the radical erosion that was taking a severe toll on the shoreline and jeopardizing the survival of the lake itself. The lake is a key aspect of the camp's program and its beauty serves well as a "front door" to the retirement community and the camp. We are so thankful for this generous gift from the retirement community!

In receiving this gift, Tel Hai Camp agreed to complete the lake project by repairing the covered bridge and installing a fountain, which would aerate the lake and add to its beauty. We removed the rotting wooden center support beam on the bridge and replaced it with a steel one. The bridge, which was sagging like a swayback horse and was becoming structurally unsound, is attractive and safe for use again. Hopefully you have noticed the new fountain in the lake. At night, the fountain is lit, and many of our neighbors at the retirement community have commented on how beautiful it is.
