

Dear readers, this month I have asked Candace Zimmer- I should be doing in man, our assistant cook, to share how God has used Tel Hai Camp to impact her life.

"God does not call the qualified; He qualifies the called."

I'm not sure who first stated these words or when I first heard them. What I do know, however, is that I have experienced the truth of this quote while working at Tel Hai. I joined the summer staff in 2006 as a kitchen assistant, and simply stated, my job was to do whatever I was told and to ask numerous questions when I didn't know what I was doing. Over time, thanks to my expanding experience and the patient guidance of other staff, I became better acquainted with the kitchen. By the end of summer 2007, working at camp was well within the boundaries of my comfort zone.

Summer 2008, however, proved to be a challenge because I had accepted the assistant cook position at camp. From a job description perspective, this meant that I began to place orders for food, create schedules and menus, and direct other kitchen workers. From my own personal perspective...well, I'll put it this way: every time I have taken the personality profile test during orientation week, I've scored *lowest* in the choleric personality type that is dominant for many leaders. For me, the phrase "administrative duties" sounds about as exciting as sitting in the kitchen dumpster for a few hours. It is one

thing to figure out what the kitchen but to tell everyone else what to do is an entirely different matter.

Needless to say, I felt out of place in a leadership position when I began that summer of camp. In my daily devotional times I sought God for strength as I told Him that I was being pushed to my limits. I



may have even informed Him that I just wasn't cut out for the whole assistant cook thing. God wasn't fazed by my weaknesses, however, and He gave me the grace to grow in skills that don't come naturally for me. During summer 2008 at Tel Hai I began to learn that God is not limited by our qualifications...or lack of them. When we follow the paths He designs for us, He is faithful to provide us with all resources and skills we need, at the precise moments we need them. Though we may feel inadequate for the tasks He has set before us, we can rest assured that we serve a God who "qualifies the called."
